Special Support

Te Whare Ako provides a safe, supportive and stimulating environment for ORRS funded students who have special needs. Some of these students also participate in mainstream classes.

A specialist ESOL teacher is available to offer advice and additional support to students for whom English is a second language. The ESOL class is multi-level and helps students develop their reading, writing, speaking and listening skills. Senior students also compete NCEA Units. ESOL students can also gain help with their subject work. A teacher aide or bilingual tutor can provide support in the mainstream classes.

Additional learning support is available for identified mainstream students through Resource Teachers Learning and Behaviour (RTLB) and are supported by our Special Education Coordinator (SENCO) and mainstream Teacher Aides (not pictured).

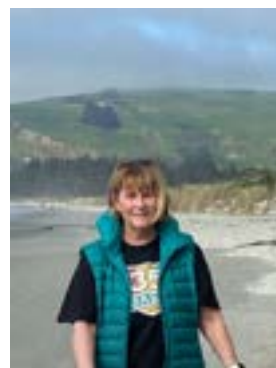

E-Tipu E Rea

E Tipu E Rea offers students who are committed to both the Te Reo and their Māori identity, the opportunity to succeed as Māori in all fields of study. This teaching and learning environment runs from Year 9 to Year 13. To be part of this programme, students and Whānau need to be committed to the kaupapa and students need to be prepared to remain at Mana College until the completion of Year 13. This is not an immersion programme but as close as a mainstream school can get to a bi-lingual setting. Mana College's goal is to staff E Tipu E Rea courses with Māori role models.

Entry to this opportunity is by an interview with our Kaiako.

A special component of our Junior school is the 'E Tipu e Rea' programme. This is a Year 9-10 combined class, which is marae-based and uses key elements of tuakana-teina, curriculum integration and whānau involvement and support. Students in this programme report how connected they feel about their school experience, "Joining E Tipu e Rea has given me a clear view of what Te Ao Māori is all about", "All of us are family and family is everything, that's what I love about the whānau unit."

Construction School

The construction school is a creative and forward-thinking approach to the provision of responsive vocational pathways. Connecting with the government's housing regeneration plan, the Porirua Workforce strategy, and the growing need for qualified builders in this community, the construction school provides students with real-life building experiences along with BCAT qualifications at Levels 2 and 3.

Currently, we have two classes running (one at year 12 and one at year 13) with each class building a 3 bedroom house from the foundations up. The houses are taken away at the end of the year and sold. Ambitiously, we aim to build up to five houses per year in the future using the construction school as a local building hub for secondary school students. Ultimately, we want local rangatahi to build houses for local people.



Service Academy

We are fortunate to have this full-time course at our College. It caters to up to 20 students ranging in age from 16 years to beyond 19 years. It is ideally suited for students who want to enter the New Zealand Defence Force or similar occupations. It also offers students the opportunity to engage with and grow in a climate that instills personal discipline and high regard for others. Students will develop both teamwork and leadership skills, and a determination to master physical and mental challenges, preparing them for an independent thinking future. Please be aware that places are limited.

Office Staff

Our friendly office staff are here to help you when you need assistance getting started at school. They are also there throughout the year to help support you with organization and finances. They are located in the main administration office just inside the main entrance to the school.

Mana College BYOD

Mana College is on a journey of Bring Your Own Device (BYOD). Being connected online is an essential element of education in the 21st Century and we want all of our ākonga to have consistent access to a device. To date, we have attempted to provide access to devices onsite but this has limitations in terms of consistent access at school and access out-of-school hours. Quite simply, it is a big advantage for students to have their own device to ensure access where and when required. Therefore, BYOD is the most effective option.

We are very aware of the cost involved with ICT so we are committed to helping whānau secure devices at an affordable level. To achieve this, we have partnered with Te Mana o Kupe Trust who offer interest-free options on Chromebook payments at as little as \$4.00 per week. Alternatively, you are welcome to purchase any Chromebook from retailers and we can help connect that device to our network.

Bikes and Lockers

What if

It is an emergency and I can't wear the correct school uniform?

- Your whanau need to telephone us (237 5424) or write a note to explain the reasons why you are not wearing the correct uniform item/s.
- Students are then to see their Dean before school starts to obtain a Uniform pass before going to class.

I want to bring my Laptop and Cellphone?

- Our vision is that everyone uses digital technologies for life and learning.
- Padded cases for laptops that come to school are highly recommended.
- We realise that for some families, a computer is beyond their budget. That said, the school does have enough hardware to provide students with a computer in class.
- Cellphones can be highly addictive and adolescents need to learn to use them responsibly.
- Cellphones must not be used for personal use in class time.
- Classroom teachers may provide permission for students to use their phones as part of their learning, otherwise, keep them in your school bag (not just sitting on your desk)
- Mana students sign an ICT user agreement which recognises their responsibilities for computer and cellphone use.

I lose an item of clothing or other personal property?

- Make sure your uniform and school gear has your name on it
- Check the area where you last had the item
- Report the details of your lost item to the office. All lost property is handed into reception.

I have option or subject problems?

- Please see your year level Dean or LA teacher

What are the school's emergency procedures?

- All of the school's emergency procedures in the event of a fire, earthquake or lockdown are posted on a large A3 sign in each classroom.
- In the event of any of the above emergencies you are to follow your teacher's instructions.
- There are regular drills for each emergency event each term, so you will get to know the procedure for any real event.
- If the school has to close because of flooding or earthquake damage your parent/caregiver will receive a text notification and details will be posted on our website, Facebook page and school App.

What if

I am away from school?

- Your parent/caregiver should telephone the school (237 5424) and tell us.
- Your parent/caregiver can leave a message on our absence line (extension 855)
- Send a message via the School App
- Students are not able to ring in and excuse themselves from school.

I need to leave school during the day?

- Try to make appointments outside school hours where possible.
- Bring a note from your parent/caregiver and an appointment card if you have one.
- When you leave, sign out at the office.
- If you return to school after your appointment, you will need to sign back in at the office.

I arrive at school late?

- Your parent/caregiver should telephone the office to explain the reason for lateness.

I feel sick?

- Tell your teacher (during class) and then go to the Nurse's office in Hauora block. If the Nurse is not present, then go to reception.
- Students are not able to leave school until they have been assessed and signed out
- The Office will contact your parent/caregiver to collect you from school.
